

Greek Prime Minister's Message for Battle of Crete



Αθήνα, 20 Μαΐου 2025

«Πάρε της Κρήτης τα βουνά και ανέβα πέτρα- πέτρα/ σε όποια πέτρα και αν θα βγεις, έναν αγώνα μέτρα».

Έναν τέτοιον αγώνα τιμούμε και φέτος: τη μάχη της Κρήτης! Ως υπερήφανος Κρητικός και εγώ, υποκλίνομαι μαζί σας στη γενναιότητα όσων αντιτάχθηκαν στη ναζιστική θηριωδία τον Μάιο του 1941. Έγραψαν, έτσι, μία απ' τις ενδοξότερες σελίδες όχι μόνο της μεγαλονήσου και της Ελλάδας. Αλλά και ολόκληρου του πολιτισμένου κόσμου.

Οι συνεχιστές του Δασκαλογιάννη και του Κόρακα απέδειξαν με το αίμα και την τόλμη τους το ανυποχώρητο πνεύμα του κρητικού λαού και την δίψα του για ελευθερία. Στο πλευρό τους, μάλιστα, είχαν τότε γενναίους Αυστραλούς και Νεοζηλανδούς μαχητές της ΑΝΖΑC που πολέμησαν με την ίδια αυτοθυσία και αφοσίωση.

Εκείνοι οι δεσμοί αδελφοσύνης και αλληλεγγύης που σφυρηλατήθηκαν στο πεδίο της μάχης, παραμένουν μέχρι και σήμερα ζωντανοί. Γιατί οι πρόγονοί σας όσο και εσείς κρατήσατε και κρατάτε πάντα ζωντανή τη γαλανόλευκη κληρονομιά, τον πολιτισμό και όλα όσα συγκροτούν το έθνος μας μέσα στο χρόνο. Ενώ οι επιτυχίες σας γίνονται κρίκοι που σας συνδέουν με την πατρώα γη και, ταυτόχρονα, με την πρόοδο των χωρών όπου ζείτε.

Greek Ambassador's Message for Battle of Crete



Canberra, 1st May 2025

Commemorative message for the 84th Anniversary of the Battle of Crete

This year, we solemnly mark the anniversary of the Battle of Crete, a defining moment of courage and sacrifice during the Second World War. In May 1941, the island of Crete became the stage of a fierce battle, as the Second Anzac Corps—comprising brave Australian and New Zealand troops—stood shoulder to shoulder with Greek and British forces against the ferocious airborne assault of Nazi Germany.

Formed from units that had already fought valiantly in the defence of mainland Greece, the Anzacs were evacuated across the Aegean to Crete. There, they once again faced overwhelming odds. Their heroism, determination, and resilience became a lasting symbol of freedom.

Of the Australians and New Zealanders who served in the Greek campaign, the Anzacs suffered thousands of casualties—killed, wounded, and taken prisoner. Today, 646 Australians lie at rest in the Commonwealth War Graves at Phaleron Athens, Rhodes, and Suda Bay Crete. We also honour the passing this year of the last surviving Anzac of the Battle of Crete, Arthur Leggett, OAM, a prisoner of war and a man of extraordinary spirit. May their memory be eternal.

The bravery of the Cretan people during this time will never be forgotten. Often fighting without weapons, they resisted the Nazis with unbreakable courage. In the face of occupation, they risked everything to shelter and assist Anzac soldiers, helping many evade capture. Their courage and humanity bound our nations together in an unbreakable bond — one that endures to this day. The descendants of the Anzacs and Australian dignitaries still visit the places where their forefathers fought. Meanwhile, senior members of the Greek military travel to Australia each year to commemorate the Battle and honour the shared sacrifice of our peoples.

Today, Greece and Australia remain close partners, united in their shared commitment to freedom and democracy. We remember with deep gratitude those who gave their lives and those who stood firm together in the darkest days. Their legacy lives on in the enduring friendship between our peoples.

Our guest speaker will be Mr Charles Blackie QSO VRD who has a Naval background and will share information of the Navy's involvement in the Battle of Crete. After the formal part of the Commemoration Memorial we will be entertained by the local Athena Greek Dance Group, which is always a colourful and much-loved performance.

There are quite a few Kiwis in Crete for this year's Commemoration Memorials and we have a NZBOC delegate who will lay wreaths at each Memorial.

Sadly, we have no known Battle of Crete Veterans left with us. Our last two veterans, Brant Robinson and Tony Madden were our last heroes to leave this earthly battlefield and go to their rest. At one of our meetings last year, our Vice President Robin Lloyd spoke of his visit to Germany with NZBOC Veteran Tony Madden, and their extraordinary adventures there.

At our last AGM in 2024 we had a most interesting presentation by NZ Historian Andrew Holyoake who spoke of the 'Tymbakion Shorts Project' and he had in his possession the actual pair of shorts, tailored by a soldier taken prisoner during the Battle of Crete in 1941, and which were signed by 127 POWs! Andrew is still researching this project for more information on these POW soldiers.



VALE ARTHUR LEGGETT OAM: A TRIBUTE TO A HERO OF THE BATTLE OF CRETE

The Cretan Federation of Australia and New Zealand wishes to formally acknowledge the passing of Mr. Arthur Leggett OAM, a distinguished Australian veteran of the Second World War and one of the last surviving servicemen who fought in the Battle of Crete.

Born on 8 September 1918, Mr. Leggett served with honour and courage during one of the most pivotal campaigns of the war. Captured during the Battle of Crete in 1941, he endured more than four years as a prisoner of war, including forced labour in the coal mines of Poland. His resilience in the face of great adversity became a hallmark of his character.

In the years following the war, Mr. Leggett dedicated himself to the remembrance of those who served and fell. He became a tireless advocate for veterans and a passionate supporter of commemorative initiatives that honoured the unique bond between Australia and Greece, particularly the people of Crete who bravely stood alongside the ANZACs.

Mr. Leggett's legacy extends beyond his military service. His commitment to peace, education, and reconciliation made him a respected figure not only within the veteran community but across generations of Australians and Greek-Australians.

His passing marks the end of an era, and the Cretan Federation of Australia and New Zealand extends its deepest condolences to his family, friends, and all who were inspired by his extraordinary life.

FAREWELL TO ARTHUR LEGGETT OAM: A LEGACY OF COURAGE AND REMEMBRANCE

We pay tribute to Mr. Arthur Leggett OAM, born on 8 September 1918 and passing away on 6 April 2025, at the remarkable age of 106.

At just 22, Mr. Leggett enlisted in the Cameron Highlanders of Western Australia before joining the first AIF unit raised in WA during World War II — the 2/11th Battalion, 6th Division. Trained as a signaller, he played a vital role in maintaining communications between companies and battalion headquarters during campaigns in the Middle East.

Mr. Leggett served with distinction in Libya, Greece, and Crete. Following the Battle of Crete, he was captured by German forces and spent nearly four years as a prisoner of war in Europe. He endured the infamous Lamsdorf Death March — an 800 km journey through rugged, mountainous terrain during one of the coldest European winters in half a century.

To honour his extraordinary life and service, a State Funeral was held at St George's Cathedral in Perth, Western Australia. The ceremony reflected the high esteem in which he was held by his community, state, and country.

The funeral began with a full military procession, featuring current and former members of the Australian Defence Force. Veterans, school students, dignitaries, and members of the public lined the streets in silent reflection as the Australian flag-draped casket, escorted by a guard of honour and accompanied by a military band, made its way to the cathedral.

Inside, the service was attended by government officials, members of the armed forces, community representatives, and members of the Cretan Brotherhood of Western Australia. Moving tributes were delivered by military representatives and by Ms Eleni Georgopoulou - Consul of Greece in Perth, on behalf of the Greek Prime Minister, Mr Kyriakos Mitsotakis. Mark Gibson delivered the family's eulogy. The Mount Lawley Senior High School choir performed Abide with Me, a poignant tribute from the school where Mr. Leggett had long shared his wartime experiences. His legacy as a storyteller, educator, and advocate for peace was remembered with deep respect.

A bugler played the Last Post, followed by a minute of silence and the Reveille — marking both farewell and the celebration of a life that had witnessed the worst of war yet championed the best of humanity.

Following the service, a private burial was held for family and close friends — a final act of remembrance for a man who gave so much and asked so little in return.

Arthur Leggett was more than a soldier. He was a symbol of resilience, humility, and wisdom. He found humour even in adversity, often recalling moments of mischief and camaraderie during his years as a prisoner of war. Carrying with him the weight of sacrifice and the importance of remembrance, he dedicated his later years to educating the next generation about the true cost of freedom.

His was a life well lived, and a legacy that will endure through all those he inspired. Lest we forget.

HONOURING THE HEROES OF CRETE & GREECE: 84TH ANNIVERSARY COMMEMORATED IN CANBERRA

The 84th Anniversary of the Battle of Crete and the Greek Campaign was marked with solemnity and pride on Wednesday 21st May 2025 at a moving commemoration held at the Australian-Hellenic Memorial, ANZAC Parade Canberra. This annual event has been co-hosted, for the past 40 years, by the Embassy of Greece and the Cretan Association of Canberra & Districts Incorporated.

The ceremony brought together a distinguished gathering of guests, dignitaries, defence representatives, and members of the Greek-Australian community, united in tribute to those who fought and fell in one of the most significant campaigns of the Second World War.

The ceremony was enriched by the presence of a Catafalque Party, RMC Band members, and flag orderlies, lending the event the appropriate ceremonial gravitas.

Among the most poignant moments of the day was the attendance of Mr Les Cook, 102, one of the last living veterans of both the Battle of Crete and the Greek Campaign. Mr Cook delivered the Ode of Remembrance, a powerful and emotional tribute that brought many in the audience to tears, as he stood as a living testament to the courage and sacrifice of 1941.

Author and poet Poli Tataraki recited Before the Skies Burned, drawn from the book Into the Moonlit Village co-authored with artist Michael Winters. The poem recounts the dramatic events of 1941 near Rethymnon, Crete, where Australian soldiers fired upon the window of the Saint George Church, a German stronghold at the time.

Later in the day, Vice Admiral Mikropoulos laid a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier on behalf of the Hellenic National Defence General Staff. He also participated in the Last Post Ceremony at the Australian War Memorial, alongside David Lewis, Assistant Secretary of the Global Partners Branch in the Department of Defence. Together, they paid homage to those who laid down their lives in defence of freedom.

The commemorative events underscored the enduring bonds between Greece, Australia, and New Zealand, honouring shared histories of resilience, sacrifice, and unwavering alliance.

HONOURING HISTORY, CELEBRATING UNITY: SYDNEY MARKS 84 YEARS SINCE THE BATTLE OF CRETE

Sydney proudly welcomed Vice Admiral Theodoros Mikropoulos, Deputy Chief of the Hellenic National Defence General Staff, who led a distinguished Greek military delegation to Australia to mark the 84th Anniversary of the Battle of Crete. His visit, supported by the Consulate General of Greece in Sydney and Greek community organisations, was filled with heartfelt commemorations, cultural connections, and a deep sense of shared history between Greece and Australia.

Vice Admiral Mikropoulos began his official visit with a courtesy call to the Consulate General of Greece in Sydney, where he was warmly received by Consul General Ioannis Mallikourtis. The meeting included fruitful discussions around the consulate's services and the enduring strength of the Greek diaspora in Australia.



Later, the delegation visited the Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of Australia, where Their Graces Bishop Christodoulos of Magnesia and Bishop lakovos of Miletoupolis welcomed them on behalf of His Eminence Archbishop Makarios. After touring the Cathedral of the Annunciation of the Theotokos, the delegation engaged in a meaningful dialogue about the Archdiocese's vital spiritual and community role.



The delegation's next stop was St Spyridon College, where they were received by Principal Mrs Amelia Katsogiannis and Parish President Mr Elia Economou. Following a campus tour, a special school assembly was held. Vice Admiral Mikropoulos delivered an inspiring address on the Battle of Crete, highlighting the powerful bond between ANZAC and Greek soldiers. His remarks were accompanied by a moving short film on the humanitarian missions of the Greek Armed Forces. The visit ended with a stirring musical performance by Year 11 and 12 students, leaving a lasting impression on all in attendance.



That afternoon, the delegation visited St Basil's NSW & ACT, where CEO Diana Horvatovic, Chairman James Jordan, and Father Miltiades Chryssavgis hosted a tour of the chapel and facilities. The Vice Admiral acknowledged the exceptional care provided by the organisation to the Greek and wider Australian community, with the visit concluding in a gift exchange.

NEW SOUTH WALES

The following day, the delegation visited the Anzac Lemnos Memorial and the Greek Orthodox Parish and Community of Kogarah, accompanied by Consul General Mallikourtis and academics from Flinders University. His Grace Bishop Christodoulos of Magnesia, Father Athanasios, and Father Socrates provided insights into the historical significance of Lemnos during World War I and the vital work of the Parish of the Resurrection—Australia's largest Greek Orthodox parish.



Friday evening's commemorative event at the Anzac Memorial in Hyde Park was co-hosted by the Consulate General of Greece in Sydney and the Cretan Association of Sydney and NSW. Dignitaries, defence personnel, community leaders, and descendants of ANZACs and Greek veterans gathered in a spirit of remembrance and unity.

Welcomes were offered by Consul General Mallikourtis and Association President Emmanuel Vitetzakis. Vice Admiral Mikropoulos then delivered a powerful keynote address, reflecting on the deep and lasting ties forged during the Battle of Crete between Greek civilians and soldiers and their Australian comrades-in-arms.

The program continued with a compelling presentation by Professor Peter Monteath, who brought the Battle of Crete to life through archival research, personal stories, and historical imagery. A vote of thanks was delivered by James Jordan, Chairman of the Joint Committee for the Commemoration of the Battle of Crete and the Greek Campaign. The evening concluded with a ceremonial gift exchange and a cocktail reception, where guests shared reflections, family stories, and renewed connections.



On Saturday morning, the official commemorations continued with the annual Cenotaph Ceremony at Martin Place. Among those in attendance were Her Excellency the Hon. Margaret Beazley AC KC, Vice Admiral Mikropoulos, Bishop Iakovos of Miletoupolis, and Consul General Mallikourtis.

That evening, the Cretan Association of Sydney and NSW hosted its Annual Dance at The Grand Vaudeville in Condell Park. The night was a vibrant celebration of unity, heritage, and remembrance. Speakers included Association President Emmanuel Vitetzakis, Consul General Ioannis Mallikourtis, Cretan Federation of Australia and New Zealand President Emmanuel Mountakis, and Vice Admiral Mikropoulos. The Very Reverend Father Panagiotis Protopsaltis offered the blessing, and the evening was masterfully emceed by Hara Vamianakis. Gifts were exchanged between the visiting delegation, the Cretan Association, and the Cretan Federation in a heartfelt gesture of appreciation and friendship.

Sunday morning saw the community gather at the historic Holy Trinity Garrison Church in Millers Point—chosen by ANZAC families over 40 years ago for its deep symbolic value. The service began with the Greek National Anthem and featured readings by Consul General Mallikourtis and Parriss McDougall, prayers, the recitation of the Ode, and the Australian National Anthem.















COMMEMORATING THE 84TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE BATTLE OF CRETE IN MELBOURNE

Last month, the Greek-Australian community in Melbourne came together to commemorate the 84th anniversary of the Battle of Crete, an event marked with respect, pride, and cultural celebration.

The commemorations began on Friday evening, 23 May, with a warm and welcoming cocktail reception at the Cretan Brotherhood that brought together dignitaries, community leaders, and guests in a spirit of unity and remembrance. A special moment during the weekend was a heartfelt address by Simon Peck, who shared the extraordinary story of his father's experience in Crete during World War II. Captured by enemy forces, his father Laurence Peck 2nd / 2nd Field Regiment, managed a daring escape and was sheltered in the Cretan mountains by courageous local civilians. With their help, he eventually made it off the island to safety. Simon's tribute served as a moving reminder of the bravery and solidarity shown by the Cretan people and acts of resistance and humanity that continue to inspire generations. As Michalis Dramoundanis so powerfully wrote:

"Αντιλαλούνε τα βουνά, φωνάζει ο Ψηλορείτης, η λεβεντιά γεννήθηκε εις στο νησί της Κρήτης."

("The mountains echo, Psiloritis cries out, Bravery was born on the island of Crete.")

On the morning of Saturday 24 May, a solemn memorial service and wreath-laying ceremony were held at the Shrine of Remembrance and the Australian Hellenic Memorial. The service was attended by distinguished guests including Vice Admiral Theodoros Mikropoulos, Deputy Chief of the Hellenic National Defence General Staff; Lieutenant Commander Dimitrios Lekakakos; Colonel Kyriakos Kyriakakos; and the Consul General of Greece in Melbourne, Ms Dimitra Georgantzoglou.

Representatives from the Federal and State Governments, the Australian Armed Forces, the Cretan community, Greek-Australian associations, and local schools also participated in the moving tribute.

That evening, the community gathered at the Cretan Village for the official Battle of Crete commemorative dinner dance—a vibrant celebration of Cretan heritage, honouring the bravery and spirit of those who fought. Through music, dance, and heartfelt performances, the evening reflected the enduring cultural pride of Crete. A standout moment was the powerful rendition of Χίτλερ να μη το καυχηθείς by our very own Ana Tsourdalaki, a song paying tribute to the heroic sacrifices of the Cretan people during World War II as well as dynamic performances by our local dance groups accompanied by live performances from Giorgos Alexandonakis and Nikos Papadogiannis as well as our local musicians George Rerakis and Prodromos Moysiadis which made the events truly special.

"Χίτλερ, να μην το καυχηθείς πως πάτησες την Κρήτη,

ξαρμάτωτη την ηύρηκες κι έλειπαν τα παιδιά τση, στα ξένα πολεμούσανε πάνω στην Αλβανία, μα πάλι πολεμήσανε"

The commemorations of the Battle of Crete served not only as a tribute to the courage and sacrifice of those who fought, but also as a celebration of the enduring bond between Greece and Australia, born in wartime, sustained through generations. Through solemn remembrance and joyful cultural expression, the events honoured the legacy of resilience and solidarity that defines both the Cretan spirit and the shared history of our communities. May we continue to remember, honour, and pass on these stories of bravery, so they echo as Psiloritis does through time.

Τον πανηγυρικό της ημέρας εκφώνησε η Αλεξάνδρα Μπούργου εκπαιδευτικός του 3ου Γυμνασίου Αγίου Νικολάου. Η Ιστορική Μάχη διαδραματίστηκε τον Μάιο του 1941 κατά τη διάρκεια του Β΄ Παγκόσμιου Πολέμου. Κάθε χρόνο έχουμε χρέος να τιμούμε τη μνήμη αυτών που θυσιάστηκαν για την Κρήτη. Έλληνες, Βρετανοί, Αυστραλοί και Νεοζηλανδοί αντιστάθηκαν με απαράμιλλο θάρρος και συμμετείχαν ενεργά στον πόλεμο ενάντια των Γερμανών. Η Μάχη της Κρήτης αποτέλεσε σύμβολο αντίστασης και ηρωισμού. Ανέδειξε το ηθικό ανάστημα ενός λαού απέναντι στη βαρβαρότητα. Η Μάχη της Κρήτης είναι ένα Ιστορικό ορόσημο. Συγχρόνως τιμήθηκε και η Ημέρα Μνήμης της Γενοκτονίας των Ελλήνων του Πόντου, που από την Ελληνική Βουλή το 1994 ανακυρήχθηκε επίσημα την 19η Μαΐου ως Ημέρα Μνήμης. Αποδίδοντας φόρο τιμής στα θύματα που χάθηκαν στους 353.000 Πόντιους Έλληνες, από το Οθωμανικό Κράτος και αργότερα από το Κεμαλικό καθεστώς , κατά την περίοδο 1914-1923. Ο Παύλος Παπαδόπουλος Πρόεδρος του Συλλόγου Μικρασιατών και Ποντίων Μεραμπέλλου εκφώνησε ομιλία τιμώντας και υπενθυμίζοντας τον ξεριζωμό των Ελλήνων του Πόντου. Ακολούθησε Επιμνημόσυνη Δέηση στο χώρο του Σημαιοστολισμένου Μνημείου των Ηρώων στην πλατεία Αγίου Νικολάου, κατάθεση στεφάνων με τελετάρχες τον καθηγητή Φυσικής Αγωγής Αντώνη Κριτσωτάκη και την καθηγήτρια Φυσικής Αγωγής Αλεξάνδρα Μαυροδοντίδου. Τηρήθηκε ενός λεπτού σιγή προς την μνήμη των θυμάτων και ο εορτασμός έκλεισε με την ανάκρουση του Εθνικού Ύμνου.

THE CRETAN FEDERATION OF AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND TURNS 45 YEARS OLD

On the 13th of April 1980, at the home of the late Panagioti Malakonaki in Sydney, representatives from The Cretan Association of Sydney & NSW, the Pancretan Brotherhood of Melbourne and Victoria and the Cretan Association of QLD, held a historic 9 hour meeting which resulted in the formation of what we call today, the Cretan Federation of Australia and New Zealand.

A temporary committee was established, consisting the following people: Nick Karefilakis, President (NSW), Dimitris Gryllakis, Vice President (VIC), Odysseas Platyrrahos, Secretary (NSW), Epaminondas Panagiotakis, Treasurer (QLD) and members Paul Magelakis (QLD), Peter Malakonakis (NSW), George Paterakis (VIC) and Dimitris Sarris (VIC).

The temporary committee undertook the task of preparing a constitution and the complete organisation of the 1st conference of the Federation in Albury New South Wales from the 26th to the 28th December 1980.

The main objectives of this new national co-operation were: (a) The cultivation and further development of relations between all the Cretans of Australia, (b) the successful co-ordination, programming and execution of the Battle of Crete Commemorations across the region on an annual basis, (c) the invitation of musical and other cultural groups from Crete for the promotion of the Cretan culture to the children, (d) the solving of general problems relating to the Cretan community in Australia, (e) the collaboration and further co-operation of the Federation with the Greek, Australian and New Zealand, Consulates, Embassy, Greek Orthodox Archdiocese of Australia and Government bodies nationwide, as well as all the Greek and Australian War veteran units (f) the representation and support of all National and Hellenic issues and (g) the close co-operation with other Cretan Unions & Federations worldwide and ultimately forming the World Confederation of Cretans.

Κατά τη διάρκεια της επίσκεψης ανακοινώθηκε με ενθουσιασμό η συνεργασία του Συλλόγου με τον κ. Αντώνη Τσουρδαλάκη, τ. Πρόεδρο Παγκοσμίου Συμβουλίου Κρητών και Κρητικής Ομοσπονδίας Αυστραλίας & Ν. Ζηλανδίας. Ο κ. Τσουρδαλάκης θα λειτουργήσει ως συνδετικός κρίκος μεταξύ του ΣΕΑ Ν. Ρεθύμνου ΔΟΤΕΣ ΖΩΗΣ και της Ελληνικής παροικίας στην Αυστραλία, ανοίγοντας νέους δρόμους επικοινωνίας, δράσεων και κοινών αξιών.

THE LEGACY OF CRETAN THYME

On the sun-drenched hillsides of Crete, where sea winds dance with mountain air, a small but mighty herb clings to the rocky soil: Cretan thyme. It flourishes in the mountain highlands of eastern Crete, where its fragrant presence has endured for millennia. The delightful ground hugging, native thyme, with its glossy green leaves and clusters of soft rose-pink flowers, brings both beauty and aroma to the sunlit slopes it calls home. In Ancient Greek, its name — thymos — meaning "courage."

Long ago, in the great palaces of Knossos, Minoan priestesses burned thyme in ceremonial fires as a sacred offering believed to purify the air and invoke the favour of the gods. But thyme was more than incense. It was medicine, it was spice, and it was strength. Warriors bathed in thyme-infused waters before battle, drawing on its name and spirit for bravery.

Hippocrates, the father of medicine praised thyme for its ability to ease respiratory ailments. Known as nature's antiseptic, thyme has long been used to treat coughs, colds, bronchitis, infections, and wounds. Monks tended thyme in monastery gardens, using it to treat wounds and infections during plagues and conflicts. Its leaves were distilled into an essential oil rich in thymol a powerful antiseptic still valued today in both medicine and natural healing. Modern research confirms thyme's powerful antimicrobial, antioxidant, and anti-inflammatory properties validating what our ancient healers always knew.

Today, herbalists continue to craft tinctures, teas, and pure essential oils from the flowering tops of Cretan thyme. Its potent compounds are commonly used in mouthwashes, throat sprays, and natural cleaning products, thanks to their powerful antimicrobial properties. A simple cup of thyme tea remains a timeless remedy, for coughs and sore throats, easing digestive discomfort and supporting overall wellness.



In Crete, thyme plays an essential role in honey production. Cretan thyme honey is known as the island's golden jewel. Amber-rich, mono floral honey is prized for its robust flavor, fragrant floral aroma, and medicinal properties. Fortunately, this treasured honey is available in Australia, allowing natural remedy enthusiasts and food lovers to experience its unique qualities far beyond the shores of the Mediterranean.

In the Cretan kitchen, thyme is a widely cherished spice. Its unmistakable floral, slightly peppery aroma evokes the rugged hillsides of the island and enhances everything from roasted lamb to hearty casseroles and fresh salads. More than a flavor enhancer, thyme is also valued for its ability to support digestion, making it both a culinary and therapeutic staple.

Still growing wild on Crete's sunlit hillsides, this humble herb reminds us that nature's simplest gifts often hold the greatest power.


